Media Arts is an intensive, immersion art making experience. Each student participates in a month of daylong creative workshops devoted to a particular discipline:

16mm filmmaking, photography, electronic sound



art, computer animation/intermedia, or digital video art.

Our goal is to develop each student's creative process. All students work on the creation of personal, meaningful, increasingly complex, artistic statements. We are interested in ideas, curiosity, discovery, critique, and the discipline of engaged creative exploration. With extensive viewings and discussions of work, each class includes a strong foundation in the history of it's medium. All classes teach fundamental, formal, aesthetic principals. Classes also involve extensive teaching of the technical skills associated with each individual discipline.

## **New For Summer 2014! Electronic Sound Art!**

What is Electronic Sound Art? You will explore the creative possibilities of sound recording, electronic music composition, sound mixing and a variety of sonic presentation forms. Working with recorded sound samples, synthesized sounds, and other audio samples, students will learn recording, electronic audio synthesis, sound processing, sound design, editing, and music composition. Electronic Sound Art class projects will include formal electronic music compositions, sound tracks for student films, audio "installations" (interactive acoustic-spaces), Musique concrete, and other musical forms.

## **MEDIA HISTORY**

On Christmas Eve in 1906, the first radio program was broadcast. Canadian-born Professor Reginald Aubrey Fessenden sent his signals from the 420-foot radio tower of the National Electric Signaling Company, at Brant Rock on the Massachusetts seacoast. Fessenden opened the program by playing "O Holy Night" on the violin. Later he recited verses from the Gospel of St. Luke, then broadcast a gramophone version of Handel's "Largo." His signal was received up to five miles away.

It was on December 28 in 1895 that Auguste and Louis Lumière opened the first movie theater at the Grand Café in Paris. Other inventors, including Thomas Edison, were working on various moving picture devices at the time. But most of those other devices could only be viewed by one person at a time. The Lumières were the first to project moving pictures on a screen, so that they could be viewed by a large audience.

# Final public review of NCCAS arts standards will launch in February

The National Coalition for Core Arts Standards (NCCAS) has scheduled a final public review of the draft PreK-12 arts standards in dance, media arts, music, theatre, and visual arts.

The review will open February 14, 2014, and close February 28. A draft reading copy of the revised standards will be available at <a href="http://nccas.wikispaces.com">http://nccas.wikispaces.com</a> on January 30.

This third and concluding review reflects NCCAS's ongoing commitment to a responsive and transparent strategy that allows adequate time for each arts discipline's standards writing team to incorporate changes to the drafts suggested by reviewers. To fully address the standards content and structural changes, the coalition has revised the project's timeline. The February review is the first in a series of new and significant benchmarks for NCCAS, leading to the web-based release of the standards in June, 2014.

Currently, the writing teams are creating a set of overarching anchor standards that articulate an alignment of artistic practice among the five art forms. Upon completion of that process, the teams will review their individual discipline standards to ensure that they are appropriately parallel with the anchor standards. The teams are also finalizing examples of model cornerstone assessments to include in the February draft review.

There will be a rolling "first-glance" version of the final standards available beginning in March. This document will showcase the fundamental structure and content of the arts standards in order to give teachers, decision makers, and the public a better understanding of what will be included and how they will inform teaching and learning.

NCCAS is the coalition of national arts and education organizations and media arts representatives that are developing the 2014 National Core Arts Standards. The new, voluntary grade-by-grade webbased standards are intended to affirm the place of arts education in a balanced core curriculum, support the 21st-century needs of students and teachers, and help ensure that all students are college and career ready. The arts standards emphasize "big ideas," philosophical foundations, enduring understandings/essential questions, and anchor/performance standards, all of which are intended to guide the curriculum development and instructional practices that leads to arts literacy for all students.
