Robert Reals' Message to NYS Media Arts Teachers

In this 2012 letter to the NYSMATA newsletter editor, **Robert Reals**, retired New York State Education Department Arts Associate, as well as a recognized leader in media arts education, recalls the beginnings of the summer school of the media arts. Later, he helped found NYSMATA, the New York State Media Arts Teachers Association.

I never realized how important the 1969 New York State Youth Film/Media Show would turn out to be. Being a hick kid from a hick hamlet in Upstate New York, I was surprised to end up at the State Education Department. Then, I ended up with fantastic bosses, during a time when the Kennedys were in office and there was money for education. How much luckier can you get?

It all worked out. The Humanities and the Arts began to roll. Dr. Vivienne Anderson was at the helm. She was a mover. The ball was thrown to her to develop audiences for the new Lincoln Center and the Saratoga Performing Arts Center.

The NYS Council on the Arts appeared on the scene. The staff at the Division of Humanities and the Arts thought a State High School for Gifted Students in the Arts was a must. We only got a couple summer schools in '72, Ballet and Orchestra. The New York City Ballet was to have a residency at Saratoga Performing Arts Center. The School of Dance was to be a part of the "Plan," students working with principal dancers of NYC Ballet. They wanted the NY Philharmonic to come to Saratoga for the summer, but they refused. I forget the politics involved, but we ended up getting Eugene Ormandy and the Philadelphia Orchestra. It turned out great. Eugene was a high-profile guy and had a top orchestra. The School of Orchestral Studies had access to the first chair Philly Orchestra players. It was all great. After the 1969 Film/Media Show, the program for media arts began to roll too. Each year it became bigger and there were more shows around the state, bigger attendance, more of everything. I insisted that we needed a Summer School for Media Arts. Movers and shakers in the arts, like Gerald O'Grady concurred. It was hard to convince the staff at State Ed, but Vivianne backed the idea. Gordon Muck was the Commissioner of Education at the time. He was a forward-looking guy. I got him and his wife to attend a Media Arts Show at SUNY Albany. He was especially impressed with Chris Wedge's presentation. Chris was 12, when he attended the 1st Show in '69.

John Christian "**Chris**" **Wedge** (born March 20, 1957) is an American film director, film producer, screenwriter, cartoonist and voice actor of animation, best known for the films Ice Age (2002), Robots (2005), Epic (2013) and Monster Trucks (2016). He is a co-founder of the animation studio **Blue Sky Studios**.

By '74 he'd gotten pretty slick. His art teacher, Bernice Necomb, at the Norwich High School, Norwich, NY, knew little about filmmaking, but was supportive and encouraging, the kind of teacher who recognized giftedness and knew how to foster it.

The next year, 1975, the State Legislature funded the School and Gerry O'Grady became the first Artistic Director. Gerry knew the ropes. He was a friend of Fr. John Culkin at the New School in NYC, a media arts mover, and that guy from Canada who wrote "The Medium is the Message." Isn't it strange, that I've forgotten the name of Marshall McLuhan? I had to look him up on the web. Gerry got himself on the panels at the NYS Council for the Arts and the National Arts Council. He brought additional monies to the program, which made the Summer School of Media Arts real special. We insisted on a six-week program. All the others were just four. Our reason was: It takes at least six weeks to make a film. The film had to be sent-out to be developed. The turn-around time required six weeks. Because it was all so new, reel-to-reel, Sony cameras, all that technical stuff, which the general community, including educators, were mystified by, made the six weeks stick, at least a few years, till the money began to dry up.

We had Creative Sound, then, Holography too, before the money began to dry up. No one seemed to object to Computer Arts, when it arrived on the curriculum list. Film and Black and White Photography were staples.

It all seemed to happen in a flash, now that I'm 83, but it was lots of hard work by all of us, the involvement of lots and lots of dedicated teachers who believed, and lots and lots of gifted students.

You are the Leaders. It is you, who make it all happen. I just tried to keep the ball rolling. Now, you keep it rolling, until those to come, take their turn. It's worth the work!

Life is wonderful!!!!!


Applications are now being accepted. There are two forms that need to be completed to apply to the School of Media Arts. The forms and detailed information are on this website:

Portfolio Requirements

- In the area of 16 mm film or video, one to three short works may be submitted (on mini-DV, DVD or via email link to the applicants work on YouTube or Vimeo with any necessary passwords) that best represent your skills and aesthetic vision. The work must be clearly identified in terms of your role in the creation of the work. If you created the work with several students, you must clearly state what work you did on the film or video.
- In the area of digital photography, students will engage in computer editing . Some darkroom experience is desired by not required. Your portfolio should include at least ten, but not more than twelve, individual photographs. Students may submit their work electronically via disk or flash drive (JPEG files are preferred). Please note flash drives and disks will not be returned to students.
- In the area of computer animation and intermedia, students should submit animations and computer based creative work. This include web site design, game design, drawings, paintings and/or graphic works created on computers and hybrid works involving some computer based component. Your portfolio should include at least five, but not more than fifteen, examples of works on disk, DVD, photocopy, or paper print.
- In the area of electronic sound art, students should submit works they best feel demonstrate their artistic interest. Students should submit sonic compositions, and/or performance recordings.

PLEASE NOTE! NYSSSA welcomes applications from students who have a strong interest in, but little or no firsthand experience with, any of our disciplines. A student who has no work to show in a particular discipline must write a sincere and compelling statement articulating her/his interest in devoting an intensive month to study. Such applications will be well served if they are accompanied by evidence of creative work in and dedicated study of some other creative medium. Acceptable "other" creative media include many disciplines: writing, poetry, sculpture, painting, drawing, theatre, voice, fashion, design. When a student is unable to submit work in the discipline to which she is applying, it is very important that a written statement articulate her interest in that discipline and her eager willingness to apply herself and learn.

Mastering Depth of Field



Every shooter wants to be able to direct the viewers' attention to the important aspects of a shot, and manipulating your depth of field is a great way to do it. In this two part series we talk about controlling your depth of field with aperture, focal length, and distance. In part two we talk about perceived depth of field, how sensor size and angle of view might affect your ability to get the depth of field you're striving for, and rack focusing. Knowing the different ways to achieve the depth of field you want for your scene will ultimately help you to craft more effective scenes.

Duties and Responsibilities:

Members of the **Board of Directors** set policy and promote the association's philosophy and by-laws.

The **Co-Presidents** work collaboratively, maintain contact with the regional directors and are the liaisons with the NYS Office of Special Projects / the Summer School of the Media Arts. The Co-Presidents represent the NYSMATA membership at NYSED meetings and conferences. They also oversee and edit the monthly/ bi-monthly newsletter.

The **Vice President** as an assistant to the Co-Presidents, maintains contact with the Regional Directors and solicits news from the membership for publication in the newsletter. The Vice President may be called upon to represent NYSMATA at meetings and functions when the Co-Presidents are unavailable.

The **term of office** for all positions is four years and officers may serve multiple consecutive terms as elected by the membership or until newly elected officers assume their post. Past officers receive the title "Emeritus" and as such serve as consultants.
